

Orange puts disease in perspective

Toronto's Shamin Mohamed Jr. delivered 19,000 nutritional supplements and more than 500 condoms during a visit last month to AIDS-ravaged South Africa.

But it was the delivery of \$1 worth of oranges to 40 children at an orphanage that had the most profound impact on the 18-year-old activist.

Mohamed, who founded the Children's AIDS Health Program when he was just 16, bought two bags of oranges on his way to the Umlazi township orphanage in Durban when he learned the chil-

dren had nothing to eat.

"One child asked, 'Do I get the whole orange for myself?'" the Runnymede Collegiate graduate said.
